

3. You are at your workplace working on your own on some project. While you are working, two other employees at your site are having a conversation about something which is inappropriate or which makes you feel uncomfortable (you decide what the topic is). You've only been there a couple of weeks and don't want to antagonize your co-workers.

4. You are working in a retail situation. There is a sale going on and the store is extremely busy. A customer comes to you and asks you a question about a particular product that you sell. You know a lot about this product, and discuss it with him/her but, for every question that you answer, the customer comes up with another one. It is clear that this customer is interested in your merchandise, but that he/she also is interested in keeping the conversation going. Meanwhile, there are other customers who need help (checking out, other questions, etc.).

5. Your mentor is the owner of a business. He/she spends time with you regularly, but there is also a business manager to whom you are expected to answer. At first, this is no problem. What this manager asks you to do is reasonable, and he/she often engages you in conversation. Over time, this manager seems to be getting more and more "friendly" towards you. He/she never says anything which is clearly inappropriate, but you begin to feel uncomfortable. After two or three weeks, the manager asks if you might like to hang out after work sometime. How should you respond to this situation?
